GETTING STARTED WITH GENEALOGY RESEARCH

Genealogy is a rewarding journey into your family's past. Whether you are a beginner or have some experience, the key to successful research is gathering as much initial information as possible and knowing where to look next.

Gather Information from Personal & Family Sources


Start with what you already have:

- Documents: Birth, marriage, and death certificates, wills, deeds, military records, passports, family bibles
- Photographs & Heirlooms: Often contain inscriptions, dates, or clues about ancestors
- Family Stories & Oral Histories: Speak to older relatives to uncover names, dates, places, and events. Even family legends may contain valuable leads
- Previous Research: Check if relatives have already done genealogical research.

Record Key Facts

Try to establish as many details as possible, for example:

- Full names (including maiden names)
- Dates of birth, marriage, and death
- Places of residence
- Occupations
- Religious affiliations
- Migration or military service details.



RESEARCHING HISTORICAL RECORDS

Once you have gathered your initial research, the next step is to locate historical records that verify and expand on your findings. Do not despair if you have not yet been able to ascertain much information, though.

Civil Registration (Birth, Marriage, Death Records)

- St Helens Borough Council Registration Service (www.sthelens.gov.uk/ copy-certificates): Certificates may be ordered for births, deaths, and marriages online or via post. There are also links to ordering from the General Register Office
- Lancashire BMD (lancashirebmd.org.uk) & FreeBMD (www.freebmd.org.uk): Indexes of local records, useful for finding certificates before ordering.

Census Records (1841-1921)

Census records are invaluable for tracing ancestors every ten years from 1841 to 1921. They provide:

- Names of household members
- Ages and relationships
- Occupations
- Birthplaces
- Addresses

Available online via Findmypast (Free at any St Helens Library with a library membership) and Ancestry.

1939 Register

Taken at the start of WWII, this register is particularly useful as it includes full dates of birth, occupations, and household members. Available online via Findmypast and Ancestry.

Parish Records (Before 1837)

For earlier records, parish registers contain baptism, marriage, and burial entries dating back to the 1500s. These are held at:

- St Helens Archive Service
- Other local Archives & Record Offices
- FamilySearch.org (Free access to many parish records)
- Ancestry & Findmypast



Electoral Registers & Directories

Electoral registers from 1832 onwards can help track ancestors between censuses. Trade directories list businesses and professionals. Available at Eccleston Library, St Helens Archive Service, and other local libraries and archives.

Military Records

Records of ancestors who served in the military include:

- WWI & WWII service records, including medal index cards (Held at The National Archives, Kew)
- St Helens Archive Service collections (MX War Records)
- Burial Registers from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission: www.cwgc.org
- Ancestry & Findmypast.
